The History of the Irish in Boston


Update:

Kicking off the afternoon, Declan Houton, Irish native and founder of Devri, preformed Irish songs on guitar and mandolin. Singing along was encouraged!




March 8, 2025


A Women's History Month Event

Secrets on the Road to Concord: What the Redcoats Were Looking For on April 19

J.L. Bell is a writer who specializes in history, analysis, and unabashed gossip about the start of the American Revolution.

Early in the spring of 1775, British army spies located four brass cannons belonging to Boston's colonial militia. The cannons had gone missing months before. British general Thomas Gage devised plans to regain the cannons, while Massachusetts patriots prepared to thwart the general's hopes.

Each side wanted control of these weapons, but each also had reasons to keep their existence a secret. That conflict would end with blood on the road to Concord.




April 10, 2025

The Hatch Mill

Presented by Bert O'Donnell of the Hatch Mill Group, this event will feature the history of the Two Mile area of Marshfield (and Scituate until 1788) related to the Hatch family, including the Hatch Mill.

On land first settled by Walter Hatch (1625 – 1699), the sawmill was built in 1812 by Deacon Joel Hatch at the site of a former grist mill. This original sawmill was "modernized" in 1872. With few further changes, the mill was operated continuously by the Hatches until it closed in 1965.

The Mill is now in the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Hatch Homestead and Mill Historic District.

Patriots Day

Old Scituate Reacts: Patriots Day, 1775

This joint program with the Norwell Historical Society is most unique!

Based on the tumultuous events of Patriots Day, 1775, local and professional actors will recreate the 1775 town meeting leading up to the Revolutionary War – complete with all the divisions, arguments, and worries of Scituate's townsfolk.

The reenactment will take place in two different performances – one at the First Parish of Norwell, the second at the First Parish of Scituate.

Come EARLY to be seated in the rooms before the action begins. Admission is free; but seating is limited!
