#### Glades Tour Extravaganza: A Fall Fête to Remember


In October, 2022, the Glades Tour unfolded with a picturesque autumn backdrop, attracting a recordbreaking 235 visitors!

The Maritime & Irish Mossing Museum Welcomes Old and New Friends

New events, including "Living in the Lighthouse and Bates House" and "The Etrusco," coupled with new street signage, renewed exhibits, a truly unique model display in the Boathouse, and the allure of new rocking chairs (in honor of Dave Ball's years of leadership) on the deck, drew in a wave of visitors throughout the year.

#### Patrick O'Keefe Irish Manuscript: Unraveling the Past

Irish scholar Brian Frykenberg unveiled his analysis of the Patrick O'Keefe Irish Manuscript in a well-attended public program, graciously sponsored by the Eire Society of Boston. The event, held on November 4th at GAR Hall, also featured a mesmerizing performance by Declan Houten, connecting us deeply with our Irish heritage.



### Website Milestones: Connecting the Past with the Present

Our online presence continues to flourish, with an increasing number of requests for family research and local inquiries. The Archivist has been diligently curating Collections Highlights and expanding research information, making history accessible with just a click.



#### Cudworth House Re-Interpretation

With the generous support of Community Preservation Act funds, Cudworth House is being transformed into a vibrant museum of decorative arts. Extensive repairs to the foundation and structure, enhanced climate control, new UV storm windows, fresh paint, and thoughtful lighting have revitalized the interiors. Approaching the property, you'll find new walkways, granite steps, and benches have been added to the landscape.

Our goal is to showcase significant treasures from the Society's Archives Collections - furniture, fine art, crafts, textiles, and artifacts – most being displayed for the first time. Our focus is on the overall aesthetic of the spaces, with the placement of objects, art, texture and color breathing new life into the historic rooms.

#### Scituate Lighthouse Restoration

On October 10<sup>th</sup>, the newly constructed lantern room arrived back in Scituate ready for the addition of its copper cladding. Lighthouse visitors witnessed the expert work of coppersmith Bob DiTullio as he meticulously pieced and applied the copper sheeting. At the same time workers were preparing the top of the lighthouse tower to receive the lantern room. On November 15, a crane hoisted the lantern into place. Two days later the copper ball was secured on top of the lantern room.

The bulk of the lighthouse restoration was completed in 2023, with the exception of finishing the grouting process and applying a fresh coat of paint to the tower masonry. Due to our recent bout of winter weather, with below freezing temperatures, it was decided to complete the final steps of restoration in the spring.

This project includes not only a complete rebuilding of the lantern room walls including new iron structural frame, weather-resistant window frames and mahogany storm windows, a rebuilt catwalk and flooring, interior woodwork, finishes, electrical components and an automatically controlled interior ventilation system. New brick and masonry restoration, a new interior wood stairway and a finish coat of paint will complete the project.

The Lighthouse Restoration has been a great joint venture of the Town of Scituate and the Scituate Historical Society. We can't wait to celebrate the restored lighthouse with town residents, Society members, project participants and lighthouse lovers in the spring!
